William "Will" Carnegie  
(1804-55); (handloom weaver)  
(of Dunfermline, Fife, Scotland); (lost job with advent of steam-powered looms, 1847); (Emigrated to Allegheny co. Pennsylvania, 1848)  
(failed in attempt to produce and sell his own cloth); (became worker in a cotton mill)

(emigrated from Scotland, 1847)

Andrew Carnegie

(1835-1919)

1850

(Emigrated with parents from Dunfermline, Fife, Scotland to Allegheny co. PA, 1847)  
(bobbin boy in cotton mill, then telegraph messenger boy); (telegraph operator for PA RR, 1853; superintendent of Pittsburgh PA district, 1859-61)  
(investor in RR industry, including Pullman sleeping cars, 1856-); (invested in Titusville PA oil production, 1861-)  
(Superintendent of Military Railways & Telegraph Lines in the East for Union Government, 1861-65)  
(founded Treiden Iron Co., 1861; Keystone Bridge Co., 1865; Keystone Telegraph Co., 1867)  
(founded Pittsburgh Carnegie Steel Co., 1870s; bought out rival Homestead Works, 1883, then Frick Coke Co., 1887)  
(author, *Triumphant Democracy*, 1886; of *Gospel of Wealth*, 1889, in which he advanced idea of welfare capitalism/philanthropy)  
(purchased Skibo Castle in Scotland, 1897; lived also in NYC)  
(sold Carnegie Steel to what became U.S. Steel, 1901, for \$480 million and became world's richest man)  
(philanthropic successes including Carnegie Institution of Technology, later part of Carnegie Mellon University,  
Carnegie Institute, Carnegie Library, Carnegie Endowment for Peace)  
(moved to Shadowbrook estate in Lenox, Massachusetts, 1916, where he died)
